Birds, Animals & Other Wild Things

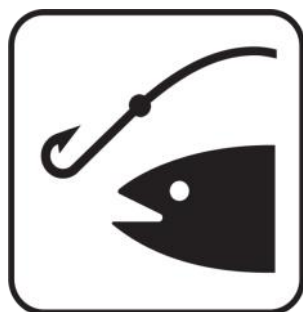
As cool days come on and there is a die-back of the bracken fern, grasses and most leafy groundcover, we can take notice of the club mosses. These are low growing evergreen plants with spreading horizontal stems. Upright branches, several inches tall, have minute, sometimes scale-like leaves and many produce spore-bearing cones at their tips. Fossil record shows that club mosses are related to major plants of prehistoric times.

The growth pattern of each type of club moss has earned it a common name. Probably the most familiar is Tree Club Moss or Princess Pine. The vertical branches of this plant give the impression of a grouping of small, thickly-branched pine trees rising from the forest floor. Linking horizontal stems run underground. Tiny cone-like spore cases grow directly from the tips of branches. This time of year these packets of spores are a golden-brown and a nudge with the finger will set a small cloud of their yellowish spores afloat on the air currents. The branches of Tree Club

Moss have long been harvested for decorative purposes. Spores of the club moss were used in make-up and bath powders, as a coating for pills and for medication. Because of the unique explosive properties the spores possessed, they were utilized to create the flash for photographic work.

Other Northwoods club mosses include, Shining Club Moss, Stiff Club Moss, Ground Cedar, and Running Ground Pine. At one period on record, over 85+ tons of these plants were collected yearly by just 2 buyers. Today in Wisconsin, Club mosses are protected and harvesting on public lands is prohibited.

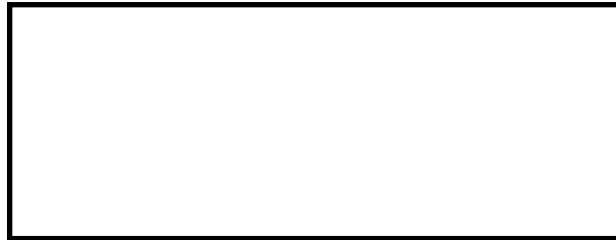
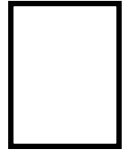


Frank's Fishing Report
