On March 28, 2013 we held our monthly general meeting and had 32 members and guests present. Our guest speaker was Jeremiah Holtz from the Rhinelander DNR office. Jeremiah was able to take the subject of those pesky squirrels we love to hate in our yards and turn it into an interesting informative and entertaining talk. Some of the highlights of the talk were that Squirrels are in the rodent family (think red squirrels!) and are relatives of the Ground Hogs and Chipmunks. The common Gray and Fox squirrels have two litters a year (2-4 babies) and are skilled swimmers. Those balls of leaves in trees they use for nests are called drays. The flying squirrel is really a glider and can soar (called volplaning) as far as 150 feet. The red squirrel as we all know is hyperactive and can have an annoying scolding chatter. A red squirrel is legal to hunt but not desirable to eat—gray and Fox can be eaten. Jeremiah was entertaining and we hope to have him back to present other wildlife topics.

Our next meeting is on April 25th at 2 PM and will feature Ted Ritter, Vilas County Invasive Species Coordinator, he will speak on Terrestrial Invasive Species. Ted will fill us in on all the types of plants we don't want around our yard and woods. Also, don't forget to mark your calendars for our Chili Supper on May 23rd and our annual picnic is on August 22nd.

Birds, Animals & Other Wild Things

With spring come the early flowers and the time to bring on the pollinators. Among the many insects carrying out this essential task, bees are the stars. In recent years, there has been a stark and worrying decline in the honey bee population and much of the job of pollination has fallen on other species of bees which include solitary ground bees.

There are many species of such solitary bees which nest in individual holes in the ground. The bees range in size from 1/2"-3/4" and may vary in color; some bluish, some green, copper or metallic red. They belong to one of several groups of bees, such as miner bees, digger bees and mason bees.

On warm spring evenings, a female ground bee begins the ritual of excavating a tubular nest hole in warm, dry soil, waterproofing its walls with saliva. A mound of the loose soil around the nest entrance makes it look much like an ant hill. The female then gathers pollen and nectar, using it to create a small ball on which to lay her single egg. The hatching larva will have a ready food supply and continues to feed on pollen and develop within the tube until it reaches adulthood in the fall.

Often these ground bees will go unnoticed, but occasionally, when you are sitting in a dry, sunny spot, you may witness activity around the nesting holes. Females will be returning to take shelter and feed their hatchling. You may spot low flying male bees on the lookout for a mate.

These solitary bees are not aggressive and rarely sting. There is no swarming or mass attack as might be expected with honey bees. The males of the group have no stinger. You can still mow your lawn and continue your regular outdoor activities without fear of being

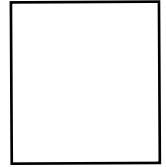
stung. Sometimes the nests may be concentrated in a place where conditions are especially suitable. In that case, try to avoid the area for the few weeks in spring time when nesting activity is at a peak. Unless you have concerns for a family member with a bee venom allergy, it's usually preferable to leave ground bees alone. These solitary bees play a vital role in ecological systems, especially in pollination of crops and wild plants and they should not be destroyed casually. If you do need to clear them from an area, a strong, sustained hosing will wash them out and encourage their exit from the spot. ~ Cora Mollen

FRANK'S FISHING REPORT

What a difference a year makes! Last year we were fishing open water at this time. As of March 31, 2013, we were still driving on Northern Waters. Southern water has now become dangerous! Be aware of changing ice condition from mourning until evening.

Last ice can be very good with fast action and big fish. Remember your line control, size of bait and last color. One rod will out-produce 3 most of the time. Move often from hole to hole even if it is four feet between holes. Watch other fisherman to locate congregations of fish. Remember to adjust your speed to force a fish to bite often, no movement and a bait high in the water column is the answer. Be a line watcher.
